## A milestone marks an anniversary

Students were amazed and knew more about our Motherland after attending a talk given by Mrs Rita Fan Hsu Lai Tai on 15<sup>th</sup> October, 2009.

Sponsored by the NTSHA and the Yuen Yuen Institute, with the aim of promoting civic education, F.4 and F.6 students had a golden chance to meet and communicate with Mrs Fan, and they undoubtedly benefited from the interaction with her. The talk was quite long, yet all students agreed that it was rewarding.

Mrs Fan is known for her long career in the public sectors. She was the President of the Legislative Council of Hong Kong from 1997 to 2008. She was also the first woman to hold that position. Mrs Fan is currently a member of the Standing Committee to the Eleventh National People's Congress of the People's Republic of China.

The talk was mainly about the challenges faced by, and the opportunities given to, China. Mrs Fan admitted that a multitude of problems exist in China now, but it is just natural as China is such a powerful country which could climb to a more powerful position in the world within a few decades. Actually, China has already identified the problems and is trying her best to solve them.

According to Mrs Fan, there are three main issues that mostly affect China now.

Firstly, environmental protection has been raised as a concern. In order to compete with other developed countries like Japan and America, large-scale infrastructures need to be built to enhance the living standards of people, as well as maintaining a high status in the world. However, pollutants are unavoidably emitted during construction. Though some machines were installed to filter the

pollutants, they were just fakes to placate the government officers. This was not only impractical but also a wasteful way to deal with the problem.

Secondly, the economy is also a serious factor that China is worried about. In the past, agriculture was the chief sector in China. With continuous development, there has been an economic shift from agriculture to finance and commerce. There are surely a lot of barriers to overcome, such as a shortage of labour and capital.



Thirdly, corruption is given the most attention. Sadly, the majority of government officers are not incorruptible. Mrs Fan said that in fact there are many cases concerning embezzlement of public funds. Worse still, the government officials fail to disclose the real situation to the central government. This perpetuates the vicious circle of poverty in China. It is believed that the corruption is due to the low monetary return. Therefore, the central administration is now raising their salaries so as to prevent government officials from engaging in corrupt activities.

Apart from our fellow schoolmates, among the audience was the Chairman of NTSHA and its members, Principal Mr Fan Chi Man, and students from a nearby school.

Mr Fan said the talk gave students a better understanding of China. 'It also aroused interest towards the Motherland,' he said proudly.

After the talk, two students were able to ask questions and exchange their ideas on a par with Mrs Fan. She was pleased that youngsters also keep an eye on the situation in China.

This was really a precious experience for students to recognise our honourable Motherland.
